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### Board of Education Public Meeting Minutes February 24, 2022

A public meeting of the Board of Education was held in hybrid format on February 24, 2022. Some Board Members, select staff, and some registered speakers participated in-person, while others participated remotely. Members of the general public who did not attend in-person participated via Zoom meeting platform.

The meeting was convened at 4:05 p.m., by Joyce Wilkerson, President. President Wilkerson acknowledged the following:

- Black History Month
- The decisions of the State Charter School Appeal Board (CAB) to uphold the Board's decisions to not renew the charters of Olney Charter High School and John B. Stetson Charter School
- Principal Richard M. Gordon IV of Paul Robeson High School for Human Services, who was named National Principal of the Year by the National Association of Secondary School Principals in 2020
- Jenna Monley, Deputy Chief of the Office of Family and Community Engagement (FACE), who was named one of *Education Week's* "2022 Leaders to Learn From",
- Mathematics Curriculum Specialist Jessica Tilli, a former mathematics and science teacher at William M. Meredith Elementary School, who has been selected by the White House for a Presidential Award for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching

Vice President Egea-Hinton made announcements concerning recording, copyright, participation in, and viewing of the meeting, and provided an update on the Superintendent search, including that:

- The Board remains on track to conduct interviews for finalist candidates in March, when it will make the names of finalist candidates public, conduct an inclusive and accessible final review process, hold a series of meetings with District stakeholders as well as one public, in-person, live-streamed town hall for each candidate, for all Philadelphians to hear from them and ask questions.

Board Member Streater and Board Member Fix-Lopez provided an update on the Pennsylvania school funding lawsuit that went to trial on November 12, 2021. He announced that closing arguments are scheduled for March 10th and that students, parents, school staff and education supporters will gather at 3 p.m. at City Hall to rally in support of fair funding on March 15th. Board Member Streater also shared that Governor Wolf released his final budget proposal, which would provide significant investments in education which would significantly improve the District's long term financial outlook, allowing us to make new investments in our students and schools. Board Member Fix-Lopez stated that there is hope that the Governor's final proposed budget will include new policies and recurring funding to address school staffing shortages, and highlighted three pipeline bills in Harrisburg:

- Senator Hughes' Teacher Recruitment, Retention and Diversity legislation – Senate Bill 99
- Representative Young's Teacher Loan Forgiveness Program – House Bill 2247
- Representative Schlossberg's Grow Our Own legislation – House Bill 2206

## **Committee Reports**

Board Member Thompson provided a report from the Parent and Community Advisory Council, including:

- PCAC Members met with the Board of Education on February 17, 2022 to discuss the following topics
  - School Selection
  - SPREE Training Reflections from District Training through the FACE Office
  - Good News in the School Communities
  - Concerns from their communities regarding CAB's decision to uphold the District's decision to non-renew the charters for Olney High School and John B. Stetson Middle School and return the schools to the control of the School District of Philadelphia

Student Board Representative Rebecca Allen provided a report on his and fellow Student Board Representative Armando Ortez's activities, which included acknowledgement and congratulations to students across the District who engaged in the school selection process, a brief statement in support of Action Item 25 - Student Voter Education & Registration Resolution, encouraging members of the Board

to vote in support of the proposed resolution, and provided an announcement of their upcoming virtual school visits.

### **Superintendent Remarks**

President Wilkerson invited Dr. Hite to provide remarks. Dr. Hite reported/commented on:

- Acknowledgement of Principal Gordon, Jenna Monley, and Jessica Tilli
- Acknowledgement of Black History Month, announcing that on Monday, February 28th from 5pm - 6:30pm, the District will host a poetry workshop with author Zetta Elliott.
- Kindergarten registration includes an update on the school selection process including a review and analysis of the results of the process and the District's plans to host town halls and in-person opportunities to continue to receive feedback on this year's process from students and parents about ways to improve the process next year.

### **Presentations/Recognitions**

Dr. Hite invited Larisa Shambaugh, Chief Talent Officer to provide an update on the District's approach to staffing. Ms. Shambaugh's presentation included an overview of national changes to the current labor market and changes in the population of working age adults. Ms. Shambaugh highlighted the impact of the shift in the national labor market, stating that the shift is consistent with what we have seen throughout the School District of Philadelphia. Ms. Shambaugh noted that not every role has been equally impacted by vacancies highlighting school-based administrators and building engineers. Ms. Shambaugh stated that the District has seen an increase in the number of vacancies across several positions highlighting student climate staff, nurses, and teachers. Ms. Shambaugh shared that the District has seen an impact on attendance including lower teacher attendance, higher substitutes request and low substitute fill rates. Lastly, Ms. Shambaugh shared the District's plan to combat the ever changes shift in the labor market which included the following: the current School District of Philadelphia teacher pipeline and plans to expand the pipeline, several strategies that have been implemented to address teacher shortages, plans to address teacher hires, and Action Items 5,6,7, 9, and 26 on this evening's agenda aimed to address the staffing challenges the District is currently facing.

Dr. Hite invited Uri Monson, Chief Financial Officer to share an update on the school budgeting process. Mr. Monson provided an overview of the school budget process including a Review Allocation Formulas and America Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Investments which are as follows: permanently doubling hours allocated for Student Climate Staff, reducing the Counselor ratio, reducing Secretary ratio, PBIS incentives, and including funding to cover the cost of caps and gowns for graduation in all high school budgets. Mr. Monson noted continued modifications to the current school budgets to include modifications to the ARPA Discretionary Program so that each off-track school will receive one discretionary position and ARPA extra-curricular funding, expansion of Out of School Time Contracts, additional teachers for English Language Learners, additional Bilingual Counseling Assistant positions, no leveling down of individuals in th 17 school selected for the new Early Hiring Initiative for FY23, and changes to Title I funds as it relates to enrollment and poverty data. Lastly, Mr. Monson shared the FY23 Budget Timeline for the School District of Philadelphia noting that the District will release the FY23 Budget in April and the Board will hold a Budget Hearing on April 21, 2022 followed by a City Council School Budget Hearing in May 2022, and the Board of Education's Budget vote on May 26, 2022.

Lisa Haver, community member, expressed concerns regarding the current state of the School District of Philadelphia, citing that there should be an elected school board that truly represents the community.

Ms. Luebbert also shared comments regarding the current staffing challenges taking place across the District.

Ashley Harris, parent/guardian, expressed satisfaction with Mastery Cleveland Elementary School and urged the Board to renew the charter for Mastery Cleveland Elementary School.

Amara Rockar, parent/guardian, expressed concerns regarding the Board's decision to approve Action Item 23 Memorandum of Agreement with The Trustees of The University of Pennsylvania - Henry C. Lea School (\$4,082,500) at the January 27, 2022 Action Meeting. Mrs. Rockar expressed the need for the District to have a written agreement that clearly outlines the University of Pennsylvania's commitment to providing appropriate support for English Language Learners Special Education students and ensuring preservation of the current Head Start program operating at Henry C. Lea Elementary School.

## **Goals and Guardrails**

Board Members Fix-Lopez introduced and facilitated the Board's Goals and Guardrails monitoring session to review progress on Reading Goal 1 – the percentage of students in grades 3-8 who are proficient on the state ELA assessment will grow from 35.7% in August 2019 to 65.0% by August 2026.

Dr. Hite provided a review of information on his assessment of progress towards this goal and highlighted the key information that is presented in this report. Dr. Hite noted that this is the third progress monitoring cycle for Reading Goal 1 and the first progress monitoring for the 2021-2022 school year. Dr. Hite shared that the initial review of student reading performance included a review of historical student performance data, identification of where the District was not on track, and unpacked why certain schools were performing differently than others. Additionally, Dr. Hite noted that in the initial review of Reading Goal 1 also included a description of the root causes impacting student reading achievement in our schools and a series of actions identified to address the root causes, which teams at the District have made progress towards implementing.

Dr. Hite highlighted some of the changes that took place over the past few months that may have an impact on performance data for grades 3-8 ELA. Changes included the discontinuation in the use of AimswebPlus and beginning in Fall 2021 all students in grades K-12 were required to take the Star Assessment. Dr. Hite noted that changes to the within-year assessments had some implications for how many students performed at grade level highlighting the key changes to Star Assessment including the 4 categories for their computer adaptive tests as follows: their At/Above Benchmark group is what the District has been using to mean At or Above Grade level. The next category in Star is On Watch, which are students who scored slightly below benchmark, but do not require Strategic intervention. Then Star has two levels called Strategic Intervention and Intensive Intervention, which correspond to Tiers 2 and 3 on Aimsweb.

Dr. Hite provided an overview of changes to the annual targets within the District's year assessments beginning in 2021-22 as a result of changes to the assessments being used. Dr. Hite discussed the changes to annual targets focusing on the shift to calculations using correlations based on the percent of students scoring at the highest assessment grouping who were predicted to score proficient or advanced on the PSSA ELA. Dr. Hite noted that K-5 took Aimsweb and 6-12 took Star and the District used a middle ground correlation of 75% to set leading indicator targets; assuming that 75% of students who scored at/above grade level would score prof/adv on PSSA.

Dr. Hite provided an overview of the three (3) keys strategies that have been prioritized for implementation during the SY21-22 school year, which included (1) Implementation of an academic framework that includes standards-aligned curriculum, (2) implementation of multi-tiered systems of supports (MTSS) framework and, (3) development of leaders and teachers through implementation of evidence-based professional learning and common planning time. Additionally, Dr. Hite provided an overview of the persistent barriers to implementation of all three of our strategies: 1) a lack of time for professional learning, and 2) school-based staff vacancies and absences.

Following Dr. Hite and team's presentation, the Board engaged in a discussion and question and answer period. Highlights of areas addressed included:

Board Member Fix-Lopez stated that the Board has accepted the Superintendent's report on the progress towards Reading Goal 1. Board Member Fix-Lopez summarized action steps that were outlined during the meeting that the District will implement to progress towards Reading Goal 1. Action steps are as follows: the District began to utilize the Star assessment for all students K-12; it is no longer utilizing aimsweb plus for students K-5; a higher percentage of students scored At/Above Grade Level in Winter, but the District is still Off-Track towards meeting its 2021-2022 Reading Goal Annual Target; the District has committed to implementing an academic framework that includes standards-aligned curriculum this framework includes guides and improved data analytics designed to support students, teachers and parents in their use and comparative tracking of improvement using the assessment tool; the District implemented the Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) Framework designed to move all students in the direction of grade level instruction with appropriate differentiated supports where necessary; and the District committed to developing leaders and teachers through the implementation of evidence-based professional learning –this included after-school development series and site-based coaching, as well as common planning time. Superintendent follow-ups include the full implementation of professional learning cycles incorporated into the calendar for the 22-23 school year, tackling staffing challenges designed to improve fill rates, increase common planning time and professional development, etc.

Following Board Member Fix-Lopez's summary of the Progress Monitoring session, Dr. Hite provided an overview of upcoming implementation presentations noting that the Board can expect to learn more about the implementation of the academic framework and professional learning, common planning time, and implementation of MTSS as a whole with a deeper focus on climate programming and Tier 1 meetings over the next few months.
